What is a Discipleship Model?

Discipleship is also referred to as:

"Working out your soul salvation"

"Spiritual Formation"

"Doing Church"

What is a Discipleship Model?

"Disciple" means continuous learner.

The suffix "ship" means state of, contained in, or condition of.

"Model" means a method, order, plan or process of doing.

What is a Christian Discipleship Model?

"A Christian discipleship model is a method, order, plan or process that contains or places individuals in a state or condition of continuous learning of the principles of living a Christcentered life."

What is the Church's Role in Discipleship?

"Spiritual formation is the task of the church. It represents neither an interesting, optional pursuit by the church nor an insignificant category in the job description of the body. Spiritual formation is at the heart of its whole purpose for existence. The church was formed to form"

(James Wilhoit, Spiritual Formation as if the Church Mattered).

What is the Church's Role in Discipleship?

Three (3) deliverables of the Christian Church

- 1. To lead individuals to become believers.
- 2. To help the believers mature to disciples.
- 3. To equip the disciples to live and function model discipleship.

Discipleship in Decline

Six Reasons for the Decline of Christian Discipleship

- 1. Cultural deterioration, affecting the church as well as the world, makes discipleship and the cost of discipleship less appealing to many rank and file Christians.
- 2. The surge of electronic media makes traditional discipleship methodology less appealing.
- 3. New and serious problems today have come up so suddenly that they have outpaced the ability of many Christians to speak effectively to them.

Discipleship in Decline

Six Reasons for the Decline of Christian Discipleship

- 4. The national loss of general biblical knowledge and understanding is so great that we must start at a very basic level.
- 5. The difference between people with no biblical background and those with strong biblical background is so pronounced, you cannot talk to both of them at the same time.
- 6. Some churches have ben over backwards so far to make church "easy" for people that they cannot make any demands on their congregations without alienating them.

What is a Christian Discipleship Model?

"A Christian discipleship model is a method, order, plan or process that contains or places individuals in a state or condition of continuous learning of the principles of living a Christcentered life."

- Passing on what we believed from generation to generation. (Indoctrination-Fellowship)
- Sharing what we believed in a structured manner
 - Church School and Bible Study. (Education-Christian Education)
- Verbalizing what we believed outside of the fellowship through outreach and witnessing. (Proclamation-Evangelism)

6 Trending Models for "Doing Church"

- 1. Traditional Discipleship Models (Baptist, Methodist, Catholic, etc.)
- 2. Purpose-Driven Models (Warren-Saddleback Church)
- 3. Seeker-Targeted Models (Hybel-Willow Creek Church)
- 4. Apostolic Models (end-time harvest)
- 5. Revival Models (Azusa, Toronto, etc.)
- 6. Cell-based Models (Seoul South Korea, New Life Church, etc.)

How has Discipleship been approached?

5 Approaches to Christian Discipleship

1. Relational - people grew in their relationship to Christ as they grew in their relationship to one another.

Reflected in the description of the Church in Acts 2. They met together and devoted themselves to the fellowship of the other believers.

5 Approaches to Christian Discipleship

2. Experimental - converts were taught about Christ and grew their relationship to him through a full immersion into a medieval multi-media experience.

Seen in the Tabernacle during the wilderness wanderings of the Israelites. Furniture, action smell was strategically designed and implemented by God to draw people closer to him.

5 Approaches to Christian Discipleship

3. Academic - believers were taught about Christ and grew in their relationship to him through a systematic, academic approach.

Seen in Romans where Paul (Romans 12) instructs his readers, "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind."

5 Approaches to Christian Discipleship

4. Personal - the church provided people with materials and taught them how to develop a personal relationship with God, and people grew in their knowledge and relationship with God through personal pursuit.

Seen where Paul exhorts Timothy (2 Tim 2:15, "Study to show thyself approved...").

5 Approaches to Christian Discipleship

5. Incarnational - people grew in their knowledge and relationship with Christ by seeking to become like him through service and outreach to others.

Seen where Jesus instructs us to take care of the hungry, thirsty, sick, poor, stranger, and prisoner (Matt 25).

5 Approaches to Christian Discipleship


- 1. Relational Approach discipleship would occur naturally when Christians live in community with one another.
- 2. Experimental discipleship was directed at all five (5) senses.
- 3. Academic discipleship is rooted in systematic teaching.
- 4. Personal discipleship would occur as a result of a personal relationship with God.
- 5. Incarnational discipleship would be as a result of responding to Jesus' call to action on behalf of the poor, sick and oppressed.
